
Big Frying Pan

Two men went fishing. One was an experienced fisherman, the other wasn't. Every time the experienced fisherman caught a big fish, he would put it in his ice chest to keep it fresh. Whenever the inexperienced fisherman caught a big fish, he threw it back. The experienced fisherman watched this go on all day and finally got tired of seeing the man waste good fish. "Why do you keep throwing back all the big fish you catch?" he asked. The inexperienced fisherman replied, "I only have a small frying pan." Sometimes, like that fisherman, we throwback the big plans, big dreams, big jobs, big opportunities that God sends our way. Our faith, be it in ourselves or in God, is too small. We laugh at that fisherman who could not figure out that all he needed was a bigger frying pan. Whether it's a problem or a possibility, God will never give you anything bigger than you can handle. We can and should confidently walk into anything God brings our way. Nothing is too big; all we need is a bigger "frying pan".

Fourth Sunday of Easter John 10:1-10

I have come that you may have life: Our image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd romanticizes the role and status of the shepherd. However, Jesus was well aware that the life of a shepherd was very difficult and they were considered to be on the low level of society. Then, as today, they were called bedouins, which means "nomads." They moved from place to place to find food and water for their flock and the flock is totally dependent on the shepherd for protection from predators and thieves. The shepherd depended on the flock for milk, meat, and wool. Such mutual dependence establishes a strong bond between shepherd and flock. Like the good shepherds and great leaders of history, Jesus leads us from the front, with wisdom and courage. Jesus used the image of shepherd and sheep to teach the people of his day, and us, that he will always lead us to what is right and good, and we can follow him in confidence and have faith in him.

Jesus the Good Shepherd: On this fourth Sunday of Easter we celebrate the feast of Christ, our good shepherd who willingly laid down his life for his flock. We celebrate our shepherd because, he loves and cares for us in all circumstances. He is willing to lead all who follow and obey him to the spring of eternal life. So, as the sheep of God's flock, let us heed the daily call of Christ our good shepherd who says: "Behold I stand at the door of your heart and knock. If you open the door, I will come in" (Rev 3:20). Yes, Jesus the good shepherd of all nations

stands there patiently knocking. He wants to lead us to the stream of eternal life. So, let us not walk away from Him. The psalmist advices us thus: "Oh that today you will listen to his voice, harden not your hearts" (Ps 95:8). May the Almighty God grant us the wisdom and grace to continue to respond obediently to Christ our Good Shepherd.

St. Dominic Savio: On this Wednesday the 6th of May Church celebrates the feast of St. Dominic Savio. Born into a peasant family at Riva, Italy, young Dominic joined Saint John Bosco as a student at the Oratory in Turin at the age of 12. He impressed John Don Bosco with his desire to be a priest and to help him in his work with neglected boys. A peacemaker and an organizer, young Dominic founded a group he called the Company of the Immaculate Conception which, besides being devotional, aided John Bosco with the boys and with manual work. As a youth, Dominic spent hours rapt in prayer. His raptures he called "my distractions." Dominic would say, "I can't do big things. But I want all I do, even the smallest thing, to be for the greater glory of God." Dominic's health, always frail, led to lung problems and he was sent home to recuperate. As was the custom of the day, he was bled in the thought that this would help, but it only worsened his condition. He died on March 9, 1857, after receiving the Last Sacraments. Saint John Bosco himself wrote the account of his life. Some thought that Dominic was too young to be considered a saint. Saint Pius X declared that just the opposite was true, and went ahead with his cause. Dominic was canonized in 1954. St Dominic Savio pray for us.
